14. Community Land

The pc noted that lorries have removed soil from site. Cavanna has confirmed this was subsoil. It was noted that the remaining pile of topsoil has been spread on the two community land fields, with the exception of the car park and compound areas. The pc has concerns about the soil that has been removed (topsoil?); what will happen to car park and compound areas; where is the surveyor's report on land ref drainage; and the ongoing legal fees. Clerk to arrange a site meeting with Cavanna. Mr Clist suggested Building Control be asked to inspect site with regard to the removal of soil.

16. County Council Report

Councillor Radford circulated the following report:-

All that are standing for election, I wish you all success, most Parish Councils find it difficult to attract members, I hope you get a full compliment.

County are proposing to cut the Mobile Library service, which will affect Hemyock, it is out for consultation, so please have your say and respond, because you have not got a permanent library and it is a good point of contact as well as book choices.

Our Cabinet has proposed a 10.5 per cent increase in our budget to fund vital services for the most vulnerable children and adults, as well as more cash to tackle potholes.

There will be increases of 18.4 per cent in spending on children's services and 8.8 per cent on adult services to keep up with a rocketing rise in demand.

And since the target budget was set last month, we have allocated an extra £2 million to tackle the increase in potholes caused by this winter's icy spells and torrential rainfall.

The budget has been finalised by the full council on 16th Feb, we will all be getting our Council Tax bills in the next couple of weeks from MDDC.

Latest figures show that the recycling rate for the district has risen to 56.56%, compared to 52.02% during the same period in 2021/22. The major contributor to the change has been food waste. More food waste has been stored correctly in food caddies instead of with non-recyclable waste meaning the amount of food waste collected has increased by 6.81%. On top of this, the amount of household non-recyclable waste has decreased by 14.46% meaning the total waste the Council collects has decreased.

Highways for maintenance of Devon roads had gradually fallen from around £35 million in 2012/13 to approximately £25 million in 2022/23. Coupled with inflationary change, in particular the rapid increase in inflation seen in 2022/23, this meant that the maintenance budget had halved in real terms compared to a decade ago. This also has the knock-on impact of forcing change in priorities with safety taking higher consideration and proactive works being stopped, leading to rapid deterioration of roads.

17. <u>District Council Report</u>

Councillor Clist reported that:-

MDDC has a new leader, Councillor Barry Warren. The Bin-it 123 - since waste collections changed to three-weekly, the district's recycling rate has risen to 57%, compared to 52% the previous year. The Council has also sent out several hundred extra recycling containers, showing the public's desire to recycle more. The change to the collection service was introduced to benefit the district in the following ways: to reduce its carbon footprint, increase recycling rates, increase the amount of food waste collected and decrease the amount of non-recyclable waste collected. The number of homeless people in the district has increased. MDDC has completed its comments on the National Planning Policy Framework consultation. The section 515 officer is lobbying government for extra funding to ensure the books are balanced.

18. <u>Highways</u>

Dartline, which operates the bus in the village, is experiencing problems driving down the High Street. It politely requests that residents ensure they are parked as near to the cottages as possible, to ensure that the buses can get through. A resident on the High Street has had their porch damaged numerous times in the last 12 months. Clerk was asked to mention in PR. During the King's Coronation event on the Saturday, Culmbridg Road will be closed and the diversion route will include High Street. The King's Coronat committee will invite High Street residents to the event and ask that they bear this in mir when parking. A suggestion was made that Highways might be asked to look at install double yellow lines.	ge ion SS id
